Types of pancreatic cancer. Exocrine cancers are by far the most common type of pancreas cancer. If you are told you have pancreatic cancer, it's most likely an exocrine pancreatic cancer. Pancreatic adenocarcinoma: About 95% of cancers of the exocrine pancreas are adenocarcinomas. These cancers usually start in the ducts of the pancreas.

Indeed, one estimate suggests that pancreatic cancer will become the second leading cause of cancer-related death in the United States within the next decade. 3 The 5-year overall survival (OS) rate remains less than 6%, with a median survival time of 3 to 6 months for metastatic disease. 4 Approximately 20% of patients present with potentially curable pancreatic cancers—resectable or borderline resectable tumors for which surgical resection is an appropriate consideration.
